Hanukkah is also known as the Festival of Lights. Hebrew word Hanukkah means "dedication," as the holiday commemorates the Jewish people's rededication to the Temple.



Hanukkah is celebrated with a number of traditions.




Lighting the Menorah

A candle is lit for each of the 8 days. There is a 9th candle on modern menorahs. This is a candle used to light the others.

Eating Fried Foods

Jewish people celebrate the miracle of the oil by eating foods cooked in oil. The two most common are latkes, which are fried potato pancakes, and sufganiyot, which are fried jelly doughnuts.






Playing Dreidel

Jewish people used dreidels when they would secretly study the Torah. Dreidels are now a symbol of resistance.





Some families celebrate Kwanzaa.



Kwanzaa is an annual celebration of African-American culture from December 26 to January 1, culminating in a communal feast called Karamu.



Each day they light a candle to highlight the principle of that day and to breathe meaning into the principles with various activities, such as reciting the sayings or writings of great black thinkers and writers, reciting original poetry, African drumming, and sharing a meal of African diaspora-inspired foods.

7 Principles of Kwanzaa

- 1.Umoja (Unity) To strive for and maintain unity in the family, community, nation, and race.
- 2. Kujichagulia (Self-Determination)
- 3.Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility)
- 4. Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics)
- 5.Nia (Purpose)
- 6. Kuumba (Creativity)
- 7. Imani (Faith)
